

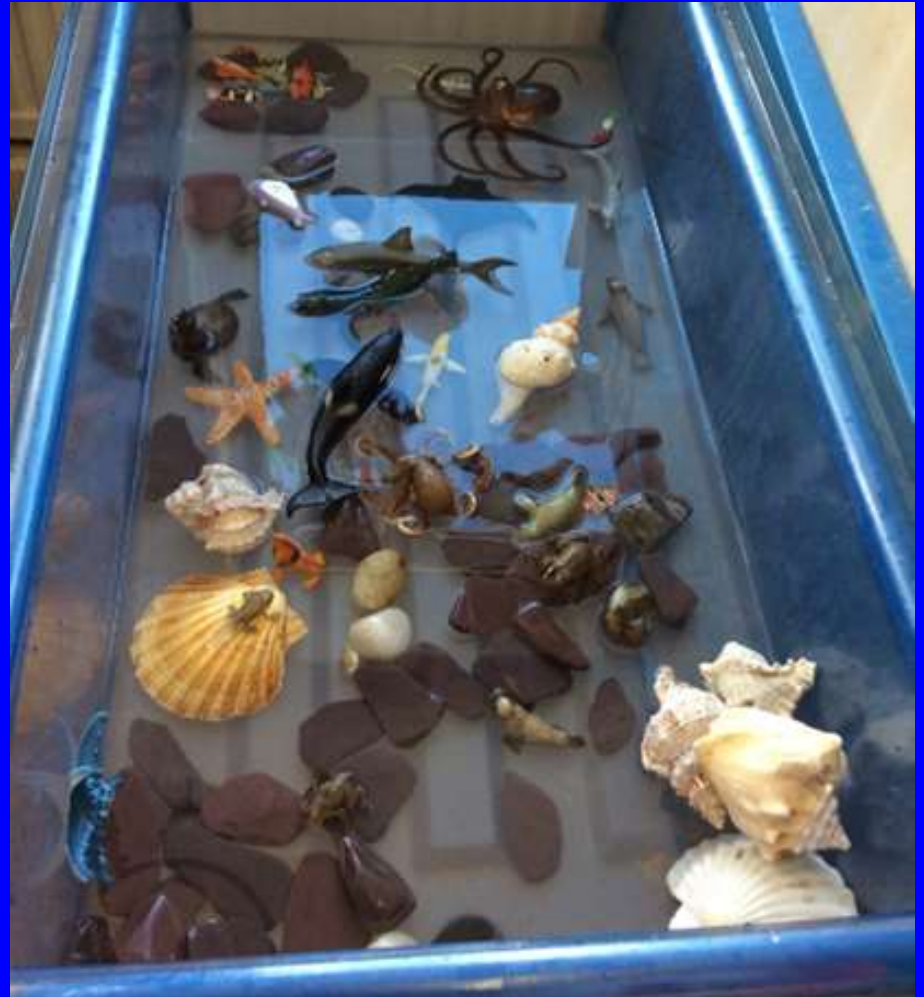
Reception have been under the sea this week. We have been looking at the film 'Finding Nemo'. We made some sharks that look just like Bruce!



Ingredients


1. 5g of trust

Which bear Mixing?

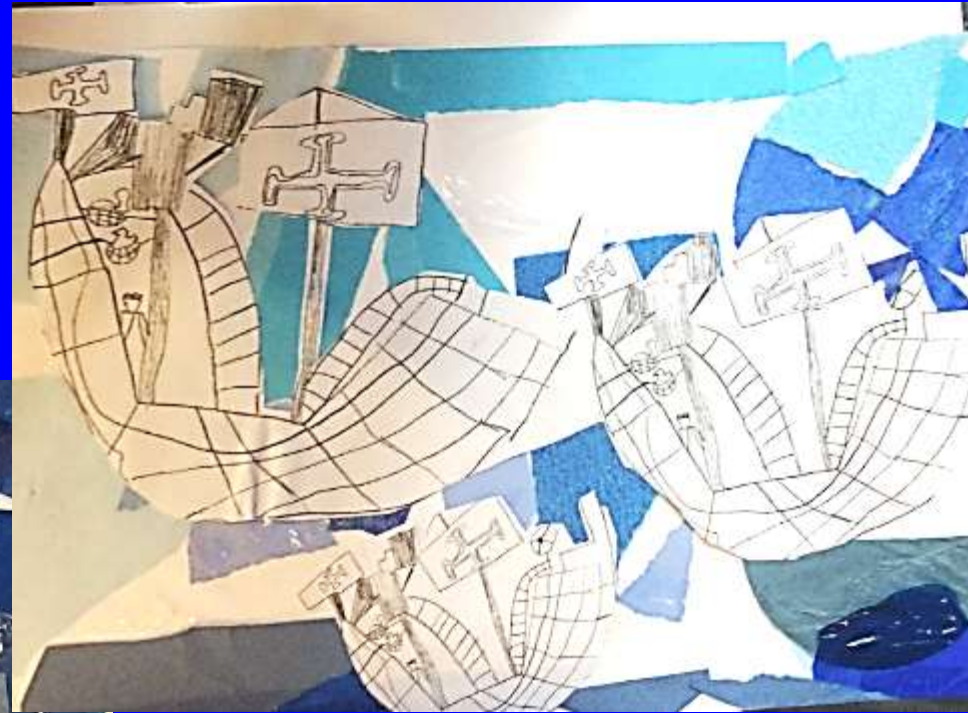
6. Gently split into eight bowls of trust.

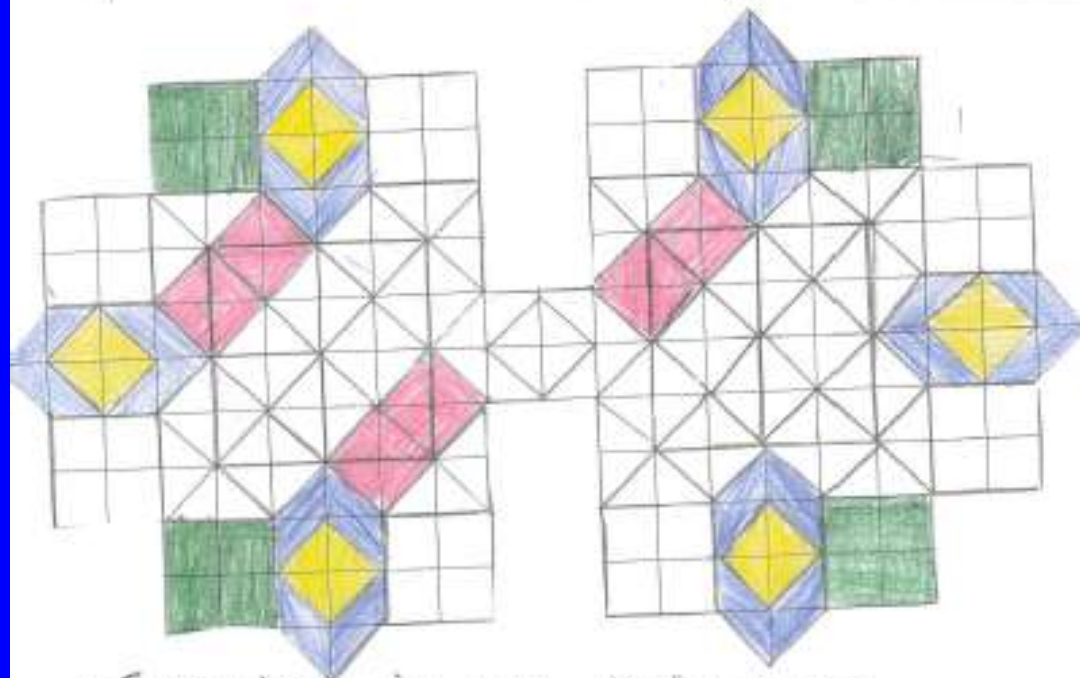

Islamic art uses a variety of intricate designs rather than animals or people. This is because artists felt that using animals and people could result in idolatry instead of Allah. Early Islamic patterns were influenced by Chinese porcelain. Islamic artists made geometric tiles to cover walls, floors and the entire outside of religious buildings with bright patterns and designs.

One of the most practical forms of Islamic art was the carpet. They are beautiful pieces of art and cover floors, walls and are used as prayer mats, wall hangings and cushions.

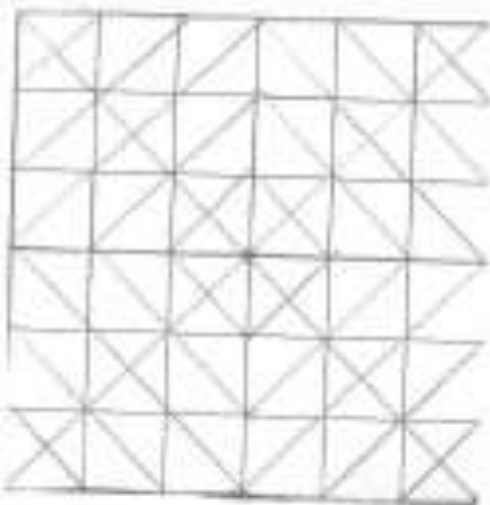


↳ Super detail in your design pattern

Some were influenced by Chinese porcelain. These patterns would be used on walls of religious buildings. Some pieces of fabric were used in homely way like cushions or wall hangings. Patterns could be carved in wood, plaster or some other materials. They could carve a religious verse into the pattern. They could be painted as well. These patterns were more often than not very delicate and detailed. They didn't usually put humans or animals in them.

Weapons from war were sometimes included to show respect or remembrance for the soldiers.
